Executive summary



Under the guidance of the Campus Chief, the Annual Report Committee Preparation Team prepared the Annual Report 2078/79 of the campus and submitted to the administration in 9th Ashwin 2079 and it was approved by campus administration on 9th Ashwin 2079. The report was prepared in with intensive study of various institutional parameters. The major aspects of this report comprise academic, physical, financial, and social progress. Another aspect of report also focuses on the analysis of strengths and weaknesses & the budgetary aspects as per the Strategic Plan.

Ayurveda Campus is continually working for producing quality Ayurveda manpower in spite of many hurdles. The institution is conducting postgraduate and graduate-level Ayurvedic academic programmes. The general trend of student enrollment in last three years (2076,

2077, and 2078) shows fulfillment of the available capacity in Bachelor program and master program was fulfilled. The enrollment trend in last three years shows complete admission as per the student intake capacity of Bachelor's program and Master's level program. The data shows that 40 students got admission in 2076 and no students were admitted due to covid-19 in 2077 and 29 students in 2078 in Bachelor degree (BAMS) and in master degree (MD Kayachikitsa) every year 2 students were admitted.

The total number of students in campus shows that at present there are 4 MD (Kayachikitsa) students and 158 BAMS students including the intern students. There are 34 Academic Staffs, 18 Hospital staffs and 31 Faculties. There are multidimensional effects on the sustainability and development of institutions due to the

gradual budgetary constraints. The staff's inadequacy has hindered in the developmental progress of the institute. Institutional hostel expenses can be saved and diverted into institutional development. Construction of Doctors' and nurses' quarters is extremely needed for quality and enhanced institutional services. The academic and hospital activities are affected due to a lack of well-equipped laboratories and human resources. The campus master plan has been formed and guidelines of various campus committee were formulated. Recruitment of needed faculties and staff plan is ongoing. The Campus has established various cells to solve the technological constraints and enhance research activities.

The financial condition of the college remains fairly sound. The main sources of college is students' fees. Academic programs rely on Professional and Phase system and fee collection has been made Phase wise. The campus has fixed income sources so that the number of students remains constant.

Campus gets only salary counting heads of the faculties and staff from the Tribhuban University.

The budget for extra faculties and staff except TU planed budget and other operating cost for the infrastructure development need to be managed by campus sources.

The capital expenditure figure shows that the sole focus of the campus is on the investment on major infrastructure development as well as the new lab establishment, procurement of books and office accessories. Then the college spends a relatively small amount of money on repair and maintenance of the infrastructure like hostels, staff quarters, and academic buildings.

As the IOM, TU, Campus the institution has linked good community interaction through technical supports in collaboration with local, province and state government in the mainstream social issues. Our graduate students involved to promote the public health awareness programs at different government hospital and community. There are different student clubs active at the campus premises. Clubs are involved to the genuine social issues like Blood Donation and different health camp. The campus has many notable strong aspects both in local and National horizons while a few weaknesses as well.

1. Introduction

Ayurveda campus is one of the constituent campuses of Tribhuvan University (TU) under the Institute of Medicine (IOM) which was established in 2029BS (1972 AD) by the initiation of the then His Majesty Government of Nepal and brought into operation from to generate capable and competitive Ayurveda graduates. The campus has been running as an autonomous campus since 2069BS. The campus is located in Kirtipur municipality of Kathmandu district, Tribhuvan University central complex premises and spreads on 107 ropani of land. It stands as one of pioneer campuses in the area of Ayurveda education in Nepal. The campus complex constituted of academic and Teaching hospital block.

Ayurveda Campus was established to produce quality Ayurveda manpower and is the only Campus which delivers Ayurveda Education under Tribhuvan University. Ayurveda is the oldest and most well-established health care system in Nepal. At least 80% of the Nepalese population is dependent upon Ayurveda for basic health care. Nepal has a glorious history of Ayurveda, and it is generally believed that most of the original understandings of the centuries-old healing process have come from the Himalayan nation.

Singh Durbar VaidyaKhana, the oldest pharmaceutical company in Nepal which was established 350 years ago during the Malla dynasty, is proof that Ayurveda is the first institutionalized system of medicine in Nepal. *The Vaidyakhana* has now been made autonomous and functioning well. Ayurveda is the first ever-established medical education in Nepal and Rajakiya Ayurveda Vidhyalaya was the first to start technical education in the country in 1993 BS. Ayurveda Campus was established by merging HMG's Ayurveda Vidhyalaya and Chikitsalaya with the Institute of Medicine in 1972.

Nepal Rajakiya Ayurveda Vidyalaya was established in 1985 BS (1928 AD) by the then Rana Prime Minister Chandra Shamsher under the Ministry of Education.

The Ayurveda Vidyalaya had launched a six-year long course which was divided into three levels. The first level was BaidhyaBinod, the second was BaidhyaBhushan and the third was BaidhyaRatna. Later in 2012 BC (1955 AD) with some revision, the course and title were changed to Ayurveda Madhyama, Shastri and Acharya and the course was conducted under the Ministry of Health.

This was put to an end after Proficiency Certificate Level Course in Ayurveda was started in Ayurveda Hospital, Nardevi premises in 2029 BS (1972 AD) following the new education policy under the Institute of Medicine, TU. Ayurveda Campus was established in 1972 AD with a PCL program (intermediate level) only.

Immediate after the restoration of Democracy, TU was encouraged to phase out the certificate program from the University. Considering this, PCL was phased out in 2049 BC (1992 AD)

Ayurveda Campus started the Bachelor of Ayurvedic Medicine and Surgery Programme (BAMS) from 2044 BS (1987 AD) with an annual intake of 15 students. Only three batches of BAMS were produced. Due to inadequate infrastructure, the BAMS programme was discontinued. Later, the name of the degree was changed to Bachelor of Ayurvedic and Modern Medicine and Surgery (BAMMS) and altogether 36 doctors with BAMMS degrees graduated. They all are treated as Integrated Medical Officers.

In 2044 BS (1987 AD) Ayurveda Campus started Auxiliary Ayurveda Health Workers (AAHW) known as *Baidya*. 40 students were enrolled per year and it was conducted for four years. Out of 170 enrolled, 106 students obtained the degree. The program was conducted with financial and technical support from WHO and phased out

by 2047 BS (1990 AD) saying that the quota was fulfilled.

In 2053 BS (1996 AD), IOM decided to re-launch BAMS program in Ayurveda Campus with a new and revised course. Since then, BAMS program is running with an annual intake of 15 initially and gradually seats have been increased to 30 seats (15 seats for the scholarship, 14 for paying and 1 for foreign students (paying) in 2065 B.S and 40 seats (30 seats for scholarship, 10 seats paying) in 2076 B.S. Students, who have passed +2 in biology sciences securing 50 percent marks, or Ayurveda Health Assistant (*Kabiraj*), are eligible for entrance examination taken by Council for health education (*chikitsa shiksha ayog*).

2. Academic Achievements

Ayurveda, the oldest existing therapeutic system used for health and well-being, is gradually becoming popular not only nationally but also globally. Ayurveda Campus, under the Institute of Medicine TU, has played a significant role to produce Ayurveda human resources in Nepal. Despite its continuous effort and enormous potentiality, Ayurveda Campus could not make progress as expected due to inadequate resource allocation and mobilization, resulting in slow growth in Ayurveda health services in Nepal. For the same new faculties were enrolled in the Campus in the fiscal year 2077. The Campus is also planning for enrolling more faculties in various departments.

Appreciating the need for advancement and expansion of Ayurveda Health Services, the Government of Nepal has already formulated the Ayurveda Health Policy in 2052 BS (1995). One of the objectives of the Ayurveda Health Policy is to establish an Institute of Ayurveda to scale up the production of human resources required for the development of Ayurveda in Nepal.

Nepal, as a mountainous country with a wide range of biodiversity, is rich in herbal and mineral medicine. A large quantity of raw materials

for herbal and mineral medicine has been exported to neighbouring countries, where they are refined, formulated and again imported to Nepal. It is a quite big loss in the economy too. This is all due to a lack of appropriately trained Ayurveda health human resources and at the same time, low investment of the University to upscale the Ayurveda education in Nepal.

However, Ayurveda Campus, despite knowing its potentiality, has not been able to expand its educational programs due to inadequate resources. Therefore, Ayurveda Campus has developed a strategic plan with its vision, mission and goals to mobilize the extra resources for upgrading and producing an adequate number of qualified Ayurveda health experts needed for the country as well as to provide evidence-based Ayurveda health services.

The campus now has an undergraduate program (BAMS) and postgraduate program MD-Kaya Chikitsa.

5. Campus and Hospital Infrastructure

Ayurveda Campus has three buildings, an Academic building, an Administrative building and one 50 bedded hospital in 107 ropanies lands. Ayurveda Campus has prepared a master plan for the construction of new buildings. The master plan has envisaged the optimum growth of the Ayurveda Campus and Teaching Hospital infrastructure. This strategic plan has visualised the establishment of the Institute of Ayurveda in long run and to become a centre of excellence in Ayurveda education, research and provide Ayurveda health services to the people of Nepal and abroad.

Furniture and Accessories: For the purpose of pedagogical activities, well-equipped and well-furnished IT friendly classrooms are established. The classroom, departments and administrative sections are well equipped with sufficient desks and benches for academic and administrative office purposes.

Library: The campus has an excellent library containing academic books, reference books, magazines, and journals both in Nepalese and Foreign languages. The library has a separate digital library with high-speed internet connectivity to facilitate the students and research scholars. The books are updated every year.

Laboratory: Separate Laboratory for Shareera Rachana, Shareera Kriya vigyana, DravyagunaVigyana and Rasa Shastra Evam Bhaisajya Kalpana Department has been established for academic purposes. Separate Yoga hall has been established for academic purpose.

Computer and CCTV: The Campus and Hospital is well equipped with CCTV and all the department and library has computer facility.

Auditorium, Multimedia, and Research Management Cell: Separate Auditorium with well-managed multimedia is allotted for different

activities. There is a separate RMC cell and EMIS on the campus.

Hygiene and sanitation: Separate coordinator and staff are allotted to maintain the hygiene and sanitation of the Campus and Hospital premise. The college building is purposefully constructed for teaching learning activities. Each of the stories of the college building consists of sufficient and clean toilets, separately for boys and girls. A constant supply of water to each of the toilets is provided.

Canteen: Separate area for the canteen has been allotted which is situated on hospital premises. The plan of expanding the canteen area and facilities is ongoing.

Sports facility: The campus provides an emphasis on extra-curricular activities such as excursions, education tours, and sporting events. Separate sport committee is allotted for the betterment of the extracullicular activities. Every year sports week is celebrated. The college has a large playground for different sporting activities; it can also be used for organizing assemblies and public events

Cultural Activity: Different cultural activities are organized by the campus and student council every year. Separate cultural committee is formulated for the smooth functioning of the cultural activity. Various cultural activities are organized time to time and the college also participated in cultural activities outside the college premise.

Transportation: The campus is connected by road and public transportation is easily accessible. In addition, the college owns a bus for transporting students and a car facility for Campus Chief and Hospital Director.

6. Administration (Institutional Management)

Ayurveda Campus has so far two programs- an academic program and a teaching hospital.

Both the programme are situated in the college premise. The campus chief is all in all in the institution. However, Hospital Director has his own role to manage the hospital and its applied programs. Therefore, Campus Chief and Hospital Director are in horizontal relations and are equally important managers to manage the institution as a whole. The campus chief will be more responsible for academic programmes

and directly looks after the academic activities of the campus in addition to his day-to-day administrative work. Organogram of the institutions have been explained in Annex 1 and Annex 2.

7. Research, documentation and publications

7.1 Journal of Ayurveda Campus (JAC)

Journal of Ayurveda Campus (JAC) is a peer-reviewed and open access, International Journal of Ayurveda Medicine, a scientific publication of Ayurveda Campus & Teaching Hospital, Institute of Medicine (IOM), and Tribhuvan University Kathmandu Nepal established in the year 2020. It is dedicated to publishing academic work and clinical studies of Ayurveda medicine and other allied sciences. It aims to accelerate the translation of scientific discovery into new or improved standards of clinical practice and promotes a wide-ranging exchange between basic, preclinical, clinical, epidemiologic, and health outcomes research in the field of Ayurveda medicine.

The first issue of the journal was released on the auspicious occasion of Dhanwantari Jayanti on 13th Nov, 2020 and second issue was released on 2nd Nov, 2021. In the second issue of JAC 20 articles and editorial were published, among which 6 were original article, 12 review article and 2 case reposts. The Journal is published annually and issued on the auspicious occasion of Dhanwantari Jayanti.

The Journal was planned to enhance the research as well as academic activities for both faculties and students.

7.2 RMC (Research Management Cell)

Research Management Cell (RMC), Ayurveda Campus was established in 2076 B.S. RMC was funded by University Grants Commission (UGC), Nepal in 2077 B.S. The cell is an autonomous body committed to excellence in research, supporting research projects for faculty members and students. One of the objectives of the Ayurveda Campus is to promote scientific study and quality research. The campus has formed a Research Management Cell (RMC) to review all Ayurveda and health research proposals to be conducted on the campus for the scientific quality to take the necessary steps to approve or disapprove such research proposals. Besides, the cell will also be responsible for:

- Undertaking competitive research and research training for faculties.
- Promote and facilitate to carry out faculty research, collaborative research, and interdisciplinary research.
- Enhance the research networking capacity of the faculty and students.

- Increase and effectively manage the resources and research support for its faculties, students and the wider university community.
- Provide education and training in research and related skills, especially for young faculties, graduate and undergraduate students and thereby enhance the academic programs of their constituent academic units.

Progress achieved By RMC in Fiscal Year 2078/79

Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE): A three days' workshop on OSCE and OSPE was organized for faculties to develop capacity in the academic evaluation. The campus has increased enrollment of students through different promotional activities. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic in the fiscal year 2077 there were not any new student enrollment. And during fiscal year 2078/79 there was enrollment of 29 students in BAMS and 2 students in MD (Kayachikitsa)

Hospital Income: TU Ayurveda Teaching Hospital is providing services for the people at a nominal cost. There is an affordable cost of services for people who comes for special Ayurvedic services such as Kshar Sutra, Panchakarma, Aphrodisiac services, Yoga and Meditation etc.

This is a regular and progressive income source for the institution. The Geriatric services were restarted in this fiscal year and almost 1702 patient benefitted from Geriatric services.

Research Grants: Ayurveda Campus is encouraging small research grants by allocating a certain amount for clinical as well as epidemiological research on different health issues for the faculties as well as students. Four faculties were awarded with research grant from Research directorate, office of Rector, TU and eight miniresearch are undergoing under the funding of RMC, Ayurveda Campus.

15. Constraints

Budgetary constraint

The allotment budget by Tribhuvan University is nominal and it has been in decreasing order. With this reduced budget, it is very hard to run the institution.

Human resource constraint

Staffs:

The inadequacy of faculties and staff is realized and to overcome the problem faculties were added in the last fiscal year and a plan is ongoing to add the required staff.

Infrastructure

Doctors and nurses' quarters: Due to the lack of Doctors and nurses' quarters there is difficulty in providing adequate quality services.

Students' hostel:

Both boy's and girl's hostel is being run on a contract basis. The total seat for the girls hostel is 25 and seat occupancy 24 at present. And for boys, the seat allotted is 40 and the occupancy is 40. A major portion of the budget is spent on arranging students' hostel.

Pharmacy:

Despite the need of a well-equipped pharmacy and dispensary for quality health service and education it is yet to be established. A dispensary in the campus premise is being run on a contract basis.

Laboratory extension:

The laboratory is running on minimal resources (human resources and equipment) and a plan is being made to expand the hospital laboratory as well as academic laboratories.

Radiology:

Lack of human resources, it is not functioning and work is undergoing to initiate the service in the next fiscal year.


16. Conclusion

- The Campus has established various cells and committees to solve the technological constraints and enhance research activities.



Annex-1: Organogram of Ayurveda Campus




Annex-2 Organogram of Ayurveda Teaching Hospital




